## SCOTLAND'S HOUSE BUILDERS OUTLINE REQUIREMENTS FOR PRIVATE SECTOR DELIVERY OF AFFORDABLE HOUSING

At a time when the private sector is increasingly expected to deliver housing for all tenures, Homes for Scotland, the organisation that represents companies building 95% of the country's new homes, has published an advice note for its members which it also hopes will assist planning authorities recognise the commercial realities of developing 'Affordable Housing' in pressurised market areas.

Director of Planning Allan Lundmark said:

"Whilst the industry accepts that the planning system can allocate land for affordable housing, local authorities need to recognise that a number of essential pre-conditions have to be met if effective delivery is to take place. These include up-to-date local plans, approved local housing strategies, housing needs assessments dealing with all tenures and market segments, and an effective land supply to meet housing requirements in full across all market segments."

Referring to the matter of percentages, he said:

"Evidence from south of the border suggests that the planning system is capable of delivering 15%. Anything above that could result in entire projects being consigned to the filing cabinet. Scotland's house builders are committed to meeting current and future housing needs and we hope that the Scottish Executive will taken account of the industry's views in its anticipated Planning Advice Note on Affordable Housing."
