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## HOUSE BUILDERS RENEW CALL FOR MORE LAND AS PROPERTY PRICES CONTINUE TO RISE

Following publication of the latest property price information from the Registers of Scotland which shows house prices continuing to rise<sup>1</sup>, Homes for Scotland, the organisation representing the country's home building industry, renewed its call for the release of more land for housing.

Executive Director Bruce Black said: "It is our view that house price inflation can only be tackled by increasing the supply of housing. Even the Scottish Executive now believes that up to 7500 additional new houses a year may be required to bring down house price inflation - an increase of over 30% on current levels<sup>2</sup>. To do this effectively, we need a land supply which is capable of meeting demand in full and delivering the new homes people need. This requires urgent improvement to the planning system allied to the commitment of Ministers to work with the industry to solve the problem."

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Notes to editors:

1. The average price for a residential property in Scotland increased again in the last quarter (April to June) and is now £108,238, according to figures released today by Registers of Scotland. The increase is a rise of 19.3 per cent from the same quarter last year and an increase of 1.2 per cent on the previous quarter.
